1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 The Scottish Executive Report 'Determined to Succeed' outlined a strategy for the development of enterprise in education in Scottish schools. A number of Education Authorities were invited by the Scottish Executive to bid for additional funding to develop enterprise education. Dundee City Council has now developed a plan for enterprise education which meets Scottish Executive criteria and has accordingly been offered £800,973 over three years to implement the plan.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 The Education Committee is recommended to:
 - i) Approve the Plan for Enterprise in Education set out in Appendix I
 - ii) Confirm the acceptance of the grant of £800,973 from the Scottish Executive

and

iii) instruct the Director of Education to implement the Plan for Enterprise in Education and to provide updates to the Education Committee as appropriate.

5.0 EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES IMPLICATIONS

5.1 A key element of the development of Enterprise in Education is to ensure that all pupils experience enterprise activities and develop enterprise skills throughout their school career. This is designed to provide all pupils with the flexible skills and knowledge which will equip them for employment in the employment market of the future.

6.0 REPORT

- 6.1 Enterprise in Education has traditionally focused on pupils in the later stages of the secondary school. Key elements have included work experience, guidance on careers and the world of work and opportunities to take part in mini enterprise activities including the design and manufacture of small products.
- 6.2 For a number of years Dundee City Council Education Department has been developing and expanding Enterprise in Education to provide a wider and more varied range of experiences for pupils in nursery, primary and secondary schools. These activities have been designed to ensure that all pupils experience a range of enterprising activities throughout their school life from nursery through primary and into secondary. They have also broadened the range of activities to include a broader knowledge of the world of work. Pupils will now gain experiences in science, technology, medicine, ICT, design and many other areas relevant to modern industry. Pupils will develop a wider range of skills for employment. These will include personal and interpersonal skills which will help to work flexibly and to be effective team members. Above pupils will be helped to develop the skills which make them 'enterprising learners' in school and in later life.
- 6.3 As a result of the ground breaking work which has been going on in Dundee schools the Dundee City Council Education Department was one of 10 invited to develop a plan for Enterprise in Education which would be supported by Scottish Executive funding.
- 6.3 The plan was based on the development of existing good practice in the City and proposes to use the additional funding to develop and extend that practice for benefit of young people in the City. The plan covers a wide spectrum of activities. The STEM Project introduces young people in primary and secondary schools to Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths through links with the universities and Sensation (Dundee Science Centre). The Apprenticeship Initiative gives pupils in S3 and S4 the opportunity to study practical trades at Dundee College while maintaining the school curriculum. Successful pupils in this programme are guaranteed a local apprenticeship. These are two of a large number of initiatives which the Enterprise in Education Plan will integrate into a coherent programme for all Dundee pupils.
- 6.4 The Enterprise in Education Plan is a result of the strong partnership which has been developed in Dundee between the Dundee City Council, Scottish Enterprise, Careers Scotland, Dundee College, the universities and local businesses and training providers.

7.0 CONCLUSION

7.1 The Enterprise in Education Plan provides a very real boost to take forward the innovative work which has been developed in Dundee schools. With the funding from the Scottish Executive experiences in enterprise education can be further developed and made available to all pupils

THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY

5. Building on what already exists, the Scottish Executive with partnership funding from the business community, must provide financial resources for appropriate experiential entrepreneurial activities in all primary, secondary and special schools.

6. The Scottish Executive, with partnership funding and support from the business community and others, must provide financial resources for the appointment of an enterprise development officer in every school cluster in Scotland to develop and implement plans for Enterprise in Education
7. Strategic partnerships, which take account of existing good practice, must be established between local authorities and Careers Scotland to engage with local businesses and organisations to improve the provision of Enterprise in Education and to ensure the business community is more fully involved.
8. There must be a major expansion in the involvement of businesses in our schools. All primary, secondary and special schools must develop partnership agreements with local businesses and other appropriate organisations. A target should be set that within every school cluster there must be no less than five such partnership agreements by 2006. This would represent a target of 2,000 such agreements across Scotland.
