1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to Inform committee of the proposed Locality Leadership Scheme to replace the Scheme of Decentralisation as approved by Committee in 2007 (Article IX of the Minute of Meeting of the Policy and Resources Committee of 25th June 2007, Report No 352- 2007).
- 1.2 To seek approval on the Local Community Plans for 2022-2027.

2 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 It is recommended that Committee:
- a) endorses the Locality Leadership Scheme and reporting mechanisms contained within this report;
 - b) notes the legislative requirement under Part 2 of the Community Empowerment Act requiring all Local Authority areas to have locality planning in place with the express outcome of reducing inequalities;
 - c) approves the Local Community Plans 2022-2027;
 - d) notes the intention to submit this paper to Dundee Partnership for noting;
 - e) notes the intention to review locality funding models.

4 MAIN TEXT

4.1 Background

4.1.1 The Scheme of Decentralisation sets out the framework for locality planning in Dundee. The Scheme establishes a Local Community Planning Partnership in each of Dundee's eight wards. These partnerships are chaired by a Senior Officer and are made up of local elected members and services from the public and voluntary sector, working together in partnerships with communities. Each Local Community Planning Partnership works to a Local Community Plan which are reviewed every five years. These are developed in partnership with the community and reflect the priorities for communities in that ward providing a local focus on City wide issues.

4.1.2 Extensive community involvement and engagement underpin these plans. Our Engage Dundee model commits to holding city wide engagement every two years as well as ongoing engagement, consultation and working with communities at a local level.

- 4.1.3 All Local Community Planning Partnership Chairs and Communities Officers come together with representation from Dundee City Council leadership Team and key partners, quarterly, to update on Local Community Planning at a Decentralisation meeting.

4.2 Refreshing Local Community Planning

- 4.2.1 The Scheme of Decentralisation was developed on a voluntary basis in line with Part 2 of the Local Government in Scotland Act 2003. It has been recognised as sector leading in Community Planning and community engagement by Education Scotland.
- 4.2.2 This voluntary model has now been replaced by a legislative requirement under Part 2 of the Community Empowerment Act requiring all Local Authority areas to have locality planning in place, with the express outcome of reducing inequalities and improving outcomes in localities. This must be achieved through joint work between public and voluntary service providers and communities.
- 4.2.3 Section 10 of the Community Empowerment Act states that each Community Planning Partnership must subdivide their local authority area into smaller areas which experience disadvantage and produce a plan for those areas. In Dundee these this has already been achieved through our Local Community Plans.
- 4.2.4 In 2020 Best Value Audit Review recognised the strength of Dundee's Local Community Planning model. It also identified a need to clarify and strengthen governance and reporting arrangements around Local Community Planning, which are requirements of the Act. Section 11 states that each Community Planning Partnership must keep the Local Community Plans and their progress under review.
- 4.2.5 Section 12 states that annual progress reports must be published by the Community Planning Partnership for each of the Local Community Plans, usually for a period starting 1 April.
- 4.2.6 Pilot work on devolving grant funding to Local Community Planning Partnerships from the Alcohol and Drugs Partnership has been successful in involving communities in decision making. In addition, the Council has delivered successful Participatory Budgeting exercises and is currently working with Communities on a Climate Fund. To build on this and the wider engagement of communities and to broaden the base of participation, in the allocation of grants, a review of current localities schemes will be undertaken.

4.3 Locality Leadership Scheme 2022-27

- 4.3.1 Each electoral ward will continue to operate a Local Community Planning Partnership. The overarching purpose of which is to develop, deliver and report on the Local Community Plan. Section 13 of the Community Empowerment Act describes the bodies who must take part in Community Planning.
- 4.3.2 Each Local Community Planning Partnership should ensure that any of those bodies and any other body, Third Sector, Private sector or community organisation with an interest in developing and delivering the Local Community Plan is given a place at the Local Community Planning Partnership.
- 4.3.3 Each community planning partnership will be led by a Locality Leader. They are leaders who can work at different levels within Dundee City Council, beyond their professional context, to a set of shared values demonstrate their commitment to addressing inequalities and working with and for communities.
- 4.3.4 A calendar of training and development will be put in place for Locality Leaders and Local Community Planning Partners to ensure that there is a consistent values-based approach to the work to reduce inequalities in the city. In addition, a handbook has been developed to sit alongside the new scheme which sets out the purpose and structure of Local Community Planning, role descriptors for different participants and provides guidelines for Local Community Planning Partnership meetings.

4.3.5 A Locality Leadership Group chaired by the Chief Executive of Dundee City Council and made up of Community Planning Partners, Leaders in Local Community Planning and community representatives will meet quarterly This group will report on Local Community Planning to Dundee Partnership, have strategic responsibility for Local Community Planning and will be responsible for producing and publishing an Annual Report on reducing inequalities in Dundee through Local Community Planning.

4.4 Local Community Plans 2022-2027

4.4.1 Appendix 1 sets out the proposed Local Community Plans for 2022 – 2027 in each of the 8 wards. These plans are a combination of community needs and aspirations developed through Engage Dundee 2021 and the subsequent Community Collectives and local approaches to delivering on Dundee’s strategic objectives.

4.4.2 Ward based data from Engage Dundee 2021 can be found under Community Engagement at <https://www.dundee.gov.uk/service-area/neighbourhood-services/communities-safety-and-protection/community-empowerment/community-empowerment-team>.

4.4.3 The plans presented in Appendix 1 represent high level Community Priorities and actions. Detailed implementation plans outlining timescales, measures and lead partners will be kept and updated by Dundee City Council Communities Officers. Five broad Community Priorities have been identified Local Community Plans will be linked into the City Plan priorities. The priorities are:

4.4.4 As described in 4.3 above and in the Locality Leadership Scheme the Local Community Planning Partnerships in each ward are responsible for implementing and monitoring the Local Community Plans, reporting to the Locality Leadership Group and producing and publishing annual reports on how they are reducing inequalities in their community.
