BACKGROUND TO THIS REPORT

As from April 2013, the Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012 has required Police Scotland to produce and publish a Local Policing Plan (LPP) for each local authority area. The LPP clearly sets out the policing priorities for Dundee.

Performance in relation to the identified policing priorities is monitored and reviewed internally on a weekly basis. Quarterly reports are produced to allow scrutiny by Dundee City Council Policy and Resources Committee. This report covers the period from 1^{st} April 2015 to 30^{th} June 2015.

Data provided in this report is for information purposes to allow Board Members to conduct their scrutiny responsibilities.

This report will make reference to crime groupings. Groups 1-4 refer to an amalgamation of four crime groups. They are Group 1, consisting of violent crime; Group 2 covering sexual offences; Group 3 covers a wide range of crimes of dishonesty; and Group 4 includes vandalism, fire-raising and malicious mischief.

Serious and Organised Crime

Tackling Serious and Organised Crime Groups (SOCGs) remains a key focus in Dundee.

Dundee Local Policing Area Officers continue to tackle those involved in the supply and distribution of controlled drugs within Dundee.


The number of drugs detections has increased by 21.7% compared to last years figures. The number of detections is not however reflective of the quantity and value of drugs seized.

Operation Slate is an on-going operation targeting individuals involved in the supply and distribution of class A Drugs in the Dundee area. This operation will continue and to date has been very successful with 26 individuals arrested for a variety of crimes and offences under the Misuse of Drugs Act and the recovery of drugs worth over £88,000. In the coming weeks and months, such Operations will continue to target those individuals who seek to profit from Serious and Organised crime.

New Psychoactive Substances (NPS) cause harm and suffering within our community. Dundee LPA Officers continue to work closely with partners to share intelligence and information in respect of the sale and misuse of NPS. Officers from Dundee LPA continue to be proactive in respect of educating those affected by substance misuse / abuse with Tayside Intensive Support Services (TISS) very much at the forefront of this approach. Recent legislation has been implemented to cover NPS and Dundee LPA will continue with the proactive approach ensuring that enforcement activity is undertaken when the opportunity presents.

Operation Lingle is a National initiative between Police Scotland and partner agencies that aims to develop good practices with regards policing on- and off-street prostitution. Dundee LPA have worked closely with Women's Rape and Sexual Abuse Centre (WRASAC) and other partner agencies during this reporting period to ensure the most effective police approach is adopted within Dundee.

Public Protection and Safety

Keeping People Safe is a key priority for the Police Service of Scotland.

Dundee City Local Policing Area has seen an overall increase in Crimes of Violence, which includes the additional recording of 10 Serious Assaults.

This increase is predominately due to a change in the Crime Recording Standards and a change in the guidelines interpreting Serious Assault.

There has been a 23.1% increase in crimes of assaults, with 607 incidents being reported to Police, up from 493 in the same period last year.

Crimes of robbery however have seen a 35% reduction from the same period last year, this equates to 7 fewer.

This period also shows a slight reduction of 1.1% with regards the detection rate for Hate Crimes. During this period there have been 45 reported Hate Crimes with 39 being detected.

As explained in previous reports, Crimes of Indecency have increased steadily during the last couple of years, largely due to increased awareness and adult survivors of historic abuse feeling ready to report incidents to Police. This quarter however has seen 30 fewer Crimes of Indecency recorded in comparison to the same period last year. This equates to a significant 21.4% reduction.

Tackling domestic abuse remains a key priority for Police Scotland. Working with our partner agencies we have continued to improve the support available to victims of domestic abuse. This period has seen a slight drop in the number of domestic abuse incidents reported to the Police. The number of these incidents which result in a crime being recorded has however seen a slight increase from 410 to 437.


Preventing Child Sexual Exploitation remains a key focus of Police Scotland. In the coming months, the Scottish Government will launch the first National Missing Person Strategy

which aims to strengthen partnership working around key vulnerable groups, such as Looked After and Accommodated Children. In the coming months, Dundee City will pilot a new protocol between Police Scotland and Dundee City Council which aims to support multiagency work when Looked After and Accommodated Children are absent or reported missing. This protocol will result in increased communication between agencies and will better protect the young people of Dundee from Child Sexual Exploitation and other associated risks.

Road Safety

The strategic priority for road safety is keeping people safe on the roads of Dundee.

The number of people killed remains at 1 during this reporting period.

Since the last report there has been a significant reduction in the number of people seriously injured on the roads of Dundee. Last year saw 7 people seriously injured and this year has seen the number decrease by 42.9%, to 4 people.

Thankfully, no children were killed as a result of road traffic incidents in this quarter. Unfortunately 2 children were seriously injured during this reporting quarter, which is an increase from 1 during this period last year.


The number of drink / drug detections has increased by 20.1% which is an increase from 38 this period last year, to 48 this year.

This can be partially attributed to the well publicised change in legislation surrounding the decrease of the legal limit for alcohol consumption. This increase in detections can also be attributed to high visibility patrols undertaken by Officers in support of the new legislation. There has been a 50% increase in the number of vehicles stopped and checked by the Divisional Road Policing Unit in this period.

In the coming months we will continue to work with our partner agencies to influence driver behaviour through education and enforcement, which will ultimately continue to make Dundee City roads safer for all.

Antisocial Behaviour


Our CentreSafe operation and Campaign Against Violence (CAV) deployments have successfully contributed to a decrease in the overall number of complaints of disorder during this reporting period. This is represented in 209 fewer complaints of anti-social behaviour compared to the same period last year, which is a 7.6% reduction.

The success of CentreSafe is evidenced in a 59.5% decrease in the number of detections for consuming alcohol in a designated place. Work by Police and partners to enforce and educate members of the public can be attributed to this reduction.

There has been an increase in reported incidents of Vandalisms and Malicious Mischief this year compared to last year although this years figures still remain below the 5 year average. There have been 106 more Vandalisms and Malicious Mischief, this year, compared to last year. Detection rates however have increased by 6.0% to 25.3% of incidents.

In recent months, Police have worked closely with our partners to reduce antisocial behaviour. High visibility patrols around areas of youth congregation have been crucial to this work.

Housebreaking and Theft

The number of Theft by Housebreaking (including attempts) has fallen by 1.3% (2 fewer).

The detection rate for this crime has seen a significant 19.7% increase compared to the same period last year, with 35.6% of this crime being detected in the first quarter of the year.

The detection for this quarter is the highest rate in the last 5 years and has been achieved by focused investigations into targeting the City's most prolific offenders. Conducting full enquiries to ensure all avenues of investigation are being carried out and effective partnership working is being applied.

By adopting this approach, a number of prolific housebreakers have been incarcerated which will assist in lower the number of recorded incidents of Theft by Housebreaking in future reporting periods.


Theft by shoplifting has also fallen by 1.6% (6 fewer). This is a small decrease and it should be noted that incidents of theft by shoplifting have remained relatively static since 2011-2012.

Detection rate remains fairly constant at 75.5% in this quarter.

Providing loss prevention advice and sharing intelligence about potential shop lifters remain key in maintaining high detection rates for this crime. Dundee Officers have forged good relationships with the retail sector throughout the city and will aim to further develop and maintain these in the coming months.

Terrorism

As Scotland's fourth largest City, with a thriving port and airport, two internationally recognised Universities, popular tourist attractions and future developments such as the Victoria and Albert Museum, it is vitally important that Dundee is responsive to the threat of terrorism.

Dundee Local Policing Area works with our national partners in ensuring the U.K. Government's CONTEST strategy is implemented effectively across the City.

CONTEST aims to reduce the risk from terrorism by reducing the threat (Prevent and Pursue) and reducing the vulnerability (Protect and Prepare):

Threat Reduction (Prevent and Pursue)

Multi-agency and collaborative partnership approaches remain crucial to successfully in challenging extremist beliefs and ideology within Dundee City. Key to this in engaging with all sections of the community and ensuring those who are vulnerable to radicalisation are identified and supported.

Vulnerability Reduction (Protect & Prepare)

Local Officers assisted by specialist national resources continue to work in raising awareness of the CONTEST strategy with partners and the community. Protective security advice and training packages have been delivered to businesses, community groups and public sector organisations within Dundee.

During this reporting period, the threat level for international terrorism to the UK was assessed as SEVERE. The National Initiative, Operation Notalia, has been implemented by Local Officers which includes enhanced checks and patrols around the community and significant sites to protect Dundee City from any potential threat.
