# 1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To advise the Committee of the performance of Dundee City Council in relation to the Scottish Local Authorities and its Family Groupings as defined within the Local Government Benchmarking Framework. This is the baseline position for future benchmarking including Public Performance Reporting for 2013/14 and Improvement Service projects in the future.

# 2 **RECOMMENDATION**

- 2.1 To request that Chief Officers review these indicators on an ongoing basis to assess if there is scope for improvements particularly in financial year 2014/2015.
- 2.2 To request that Chief Officers include these indicators as appropriate in future Service Plans.
- 2.3 To include the Local Government Benchmarking Framework indicators in future Corporate Performance Reports.

# **3 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

3.1 None.

# 4 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 To assist each authority deliver Best Value the Scottish Society of Local Authority Chief Executives (SOLACE) initiated a joint benchmarking project with the Improvement Service to agree a list of indicators that can be produced each year as part of a benchmarking framework. Following a two year process of research and consultation the first annual publication was issued in March 2013. This provided data for the years 2010/2011 and 2011/2012. Data for 2012/2013 was published in March 2014 and made available to the public on the Improvement Service's website.
- 4.2 For 2012/2013, 52 measures of local government cost, performance and customer satisfaction were published for each local authority to enable suitable comparisons to be made. The appendix provides an analysis of the data for Dundee City Council, showing how Dundee compares to the Scottish Average and its Family Group of similar local authorities.
- 4.3 The Improvement Service has established two sets of Family Groups for Dundee. People Services which relates to Education, Social Work and Housing and Other Services which relates to all other areas of local authority service provision.

- 4.4 The above groups were established as those authorities share similar characteristics such as deprivation and or urban density and are best suited for inter-authority comparison. Details of Family Group rankings are provided in the appendix to the report.
- 4.5 The paragraphs which follow provide an overview, based on feedback from officers, on how Dundee City Council compares to the Scottish Average and its Family Groupings.
- 4.6 "Perception" indicators, that is those indicators which relate to stakeholder surveys being carried out should be treated with great caution. The Scottish Householder Survey from which this information is derived is not considered robust and the data is only collected every second year. This has been recognised by the Improvement Service which has established a working group consisting of Council representatives with a view to improving the reliability and comparability of these indicators in the near future.

# 5 **PERFORMANCE OVERVIEW**

# 5.1 OVERALL PERFORMANCE

5.1.1 Overall the Council is collecting 56 indicators under its Local Government Benchmarking Framework, 26 of which have improved performance compared to the previous year (51%). This figure will provide a useful benchmark to measure the Council's general performance level in future years.

# 5.2 <u>CHILDREN'S SERVICES</u>

5.2.1 There are twelve indicators for this group for which eight indicators improved over the previous year's figures (66%). Cost per pre-school place was the best in our Family Group whilst primary school cost per pupil was also ranked highly. The Balance of Care indicator for looked after children is one of the best in Scotland and the cost indicators are currently being reviewed.

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## 5.3 CORPORATE SERVICES (INC CORPORATE ASSETS)

5.3.1 There are ten indicators for this group for which five indicators improved over the past year's figures (50%). Rankings remain high for noise complaints and invoice payments. The per capita cost of collecting Council Tax is one of the highest but is generally comparable with the other cities and Dundee's smaller population increases the unit cost per dwelling.

## 5.4 <u>SOCIAL WORK</u>

- 5.4.1 There are five indicators in this group and Dundee improved on only one of those indicators (20%). Costs for home care are one of the highest in Scotland and further investigation is underway on this data.
- 5.4.2 It is important to note that when the +/-0.5% threshold is applied to the data, performance on the perception indicator is the only item which has significantly declined.

# 5.5 <u>CULTURE AND LEISURE</u>

5.5.1 There are eight indicators in this group and Dundee improved on four of those when compared to the previous year (50%). Rankings remain generally high across the sub-groupings with libraries receiving the best customer satisfaction rating in Scotland.

#### 5.6 <u>ENVIRONMENT</u>

5.6.1 There are ten indicators in this group, four of which could not be compared to the previous year. Of the remaining six Dundee improved on three of those (50%). Rankings remain high particularly for the customer satisfaction indicators and the cleanliness indicators.

# 5.7 ROADS MAINTENANCE

- 5.7.1 There are five indicators in this group and Dundee improved on only one of these indicators. It has to be recognised that there is an element of investment rather than cost for all these indicators and that Dundee's rankings compared to other authorities are very high.
- 5.7.2 It is also important to note that the Improvement Service is currently carrying out a pilot project to study these indicators in more detail and Dundee is playing a key role in this project.

# 5.8 HOUSING SERVICES

5.8.1. There are five indicators being collected in this group and of those four indicators improved on performance compared to the previous year (80%). Progress on houses attaining the quality standard and becoming more energy efficient has been particularly rapid.

Note: performance can only be compared to three other Councils in Dundee's family grouping for Housing Services.

## 5.9 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

5..1 There is only one indicator in this category which is new, performance for which is ranked high.

# 6 CONCLUSION

The Council continues to make continuous improvements to most of the services covered by the Local Government Benchmarking Framework indicators. This report will provide a useful benchmark against which the overall performance of Dundee City Council will be measured in future years. The framework is still in its first two years and in future years the report will include lessons learned by family group studies into best practice in selected indicators.

# 7 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

This report has been screened for any policy implications in respect of Sustainability, Strategic Environmental Assessment, Anti-Poverty, Equality Impact Assessment and Risk Management. There are no major issues due to the nature of the report.

# 2.3 Looked After Children

#### Service comments

The recent Changing For The Future review on Looked After Children found that significant savings had already been made within Children's Services but that the calculation of value for money, i.e. outcomes for children per cost, requires much deeper analysis. The Loughborough University Child and Family Research unit was commissioned in 2013 to carefully map costs and outcomes across eight looked after processes and will commence work in Dundee on 28<sup>th</sup> April 2014 with a report to be available by December 2014.

#### Service comments

Item 1 – Resources are monitored on a regular basis in an endeavour to reduce this cost. The Council has recently introduced an on-line facility which enables customers to have their Council Tax bills sent electronically. Also, the Council has recently established a Corporate Debt & Welfare Reform team to administer all debt for the Council. It is anticipated that both of the above will reduce the cost per dwelling of collecting Council Tax.

Item 2 – Every effort is made to collect the Council Tax. The number of direct debit payers has increased year on year. Staff are pro-active in contacting debtors to either agree a payment arrangement or to contact them when an arrangement is not being maintained. However there continues to be high levels of deprivation within the city, which does have a significant impact on the levels of collection.

# Satisfaction with Social Work Services

The data comes from the Scottish Household Survey and not Social Work surveys which are much more positive. DCC is due to do a service user survey in 2014 and the results of this will be useful to help the Council ascertain satisfaction levels and they will be used to supplement national surveys.

# % of people with intensive needs receiving care at home

DCC increased the number of people receiving intensive care at home and reduced geriatric long stay beds. However the reason why this indicator has not improved is due to occupancy in care homes for older people.

# Home Care Costs per Hour

DCC has been investigating this over the last 6 months and a number of measures are in place to ensure that all homecare hours are captured for the census on 31 March 2014

- guidance to staff has been issued

- DCC will include home based respite where this was not included previously

- manual recording exercises are taking place for unrecorded hours, food train and social care response. These hours were not captured previously as they were not being recorded against individuals.

Recycling rate figure has dropped 4 percentage points in the last year. The main contributory factor was the major outage at the DERL plant caused by fire damage in May 2012. This been repaired and a major refit carried out at the plant. This should contribute towards reversing the trend shown. The Environment Committee approved a plan to increase recycling collection

The increase of 7% on disposal costs can be attributed to additional costs associated with the DERL plant fire in May 2012 and a drop in trade waste income.

There has been an improvement in street cleaning costs. Based on the Scottish Household survey the levels of customer satisfaction for refuse collection and street cleansing are among the top five in Scotland.

# Service comments

The "Cost of maintenance per kilometre of roads", should actually be called investment as this is not just cost. An authority with a larger network than Dundee but spending the same would be seen as a better performer, this is not necessarily the case. This is being investigated as part of the pilot.

Road Condition Indicator:-

It is positive that this is being maintained in a general steady state.

Dundee is highlighted as a high ranking authority within Scotland and its family group, however this needs to be considered in context. The current condition within Dundee is anticipated to decline, therefore commitment has been given to invest to try and maintain the existing position. The ranking position within Scotland & family group is positive, although this can be viewed as a good performer within an overall context of criticism by the public.
