### 1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 This report outlines proposals to reduce Children and Families Service funding to six Third Sector services by 5% and carry out a full review of all Third Sector funding in 2024--25.

### 2 RECOMMENDATION

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Committee:
  - a approve proposals to reduce funding to Third Sector service providers who receive a grant of over £100,000 by 5% in 2024- 25 as detailed in paragraph 4.1 of this report; and
  - b remit the Executive Director to carry out a full review of all Third Sector services and provide an update in 12 months.

#### 3 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 3.1 The total savings realised if funding is reduced by 5% to the six Third Sector organisations currently funded at over £100,000 would be £104,000.
- 3.2 This would reduce the total expenditure on Third Sector Commissioned services from a current £2.391m to £2.287m.

#### 4 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 The Children and Families Service commissions 14 Third Sector organisations to provide additional support to vulnerable children, young people and families.
- 4.2 These services range in cost from £12,863 for Youth Link Befriending Services to £830,000 for Action for Children Supported Accommodation.
- 4.3 Full details of all current Third Sector funding, the nature of service provision and proposed savings relating to each of the 6 organisations funded at over £100k are outlined below:

- 4.4 The proposed reductions in the larger grants provided by the Council will help ensure that smaller organisations are not disproportionately impacted whilst a full review is undertaken.
- 4.5 As some of the funding also generates leveraged income for some organisations, the proposed review carried out collaboratively with partners could potentially enable this to be mitigated.
- 4.6 Where these organisations are looking at transformational change there is an opportunity for them to apply to the Whole Family Wellbeing Funding (WFWF) for support to deliver this.
- 4.7 Opportunities for such transformational change could include:
  - Action for Children providing outreach support to care experienced young people moving into adulthood to enhance transitions to independent living.
  - **Barnardo's** providing enhanced support to pupils with additional support needs transitioning from primary to secondary school.
  - One Parent Families providing targeted advice and support to single mothers/fathers whose children/young people are considered to be on the edge of care.
  - **Inclusion** providing enhanced support to young people with disabilities as they transition into early adulthood.
  - **Includem** coordinating the implementation of contextual safeguarding for young people at risk of significant harm.
  - **Aberlour** providing targeted support to care experienced young people with a substance use problem living in residential care.
- 4.8 The Children and Families Service would also continue to support organisations to minimise the impact of reductions by fully maximising existing resources and exploring alternative funding.

### 5 SUMMARY

- 5.1 It is recommended that Committee approves the proposal to reduce funding by 5% to Third Sector organisations who receive grant funding over £100,000 and carry out a full review of all Third Sector services in 2024/25.
- 5.2 The review would be carried out in accordance with Best Value including a shared focus on key strategic priorities and opportunities to rationalise and integrate where possible.

### 6 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

6.1 This report has been subject to an Integrated Impact Assessment to identify impacts on Equality & Diversity, Fairness and Poverty, Environment and Corporate Risk. ### Description:

This report proposes a 5% reduction in funding to Children and Families Service commissioned services currently funded at over £100,000 per year. This equates to 6 organisations; reductions of between £6,000 and £42,000; and a total combined annual saving of £104,000. The proposal includes mitigations of deploying Whole Family Wellbeing Funding (WFWF) with a caveat that organisations adapt elements of service delivery to comply with this funding criteria and carrying out a full review of all commissioned services in 2024-25.

### Intended Outcome:

The intended outcome is to contribute towards the Council imperative to operate within budget without reducing existing services to vulnerable children, young people and families, re-focusing aspects of them to mirror WFWF criteria and ensuring that they continue to address key priorities. The proposed deployment of WFWF is compliant with the criteria and the changes to elements of service delivery such as accommodation pathways for care leavers and support to families with a child or young person with a disability - are based on identified areas for improvement Period Covered: 29/02/2024 to 01/03/2025.

### Monitoring:

The proposal will be monitored via routine contract management processes which will take account of adjustments to service specifications. The proposed review of all commissioned services, which will be informed by Best Value principles and carried out collaboratively with Third Sector partners, will be managed and monitored by the Children and Families Service. A full report covering all Third Sector services will be submitted to Elected Members for continued oversight and approval.
