1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To seek approval for the discontinuing of domestic garden waste collections during the winter months from December to February.

2 RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 Discontinue collections of domestic garden waste during the three winter months December to February.

3 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 The cessation of the garden waste service over the winter months would result in an annual saving of £45,000.

4 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 Dundee City Council currently offers a separate kerbside collection for garden waste from domestic properties. The scheme was launched in 1990 and has been expanded through the years. It is now offered to approximately 43,000 properties throughout the city. The brown bins are collected on a fortnightly cycle from March to November with a monthly collection taking place from December to February. The collection of green waste is not a statutory service that Dundee City Council has to provide to householders.
- 4.2 An analysis of collection tonnages throughout the year shows that the tonnages vary on a month to month basis, with peak collections taking place in the summer period, and quantities collected dropping off during the winter. During the winter months, collections change from fortnightly to monthly, and it has been calculated that on average each route collects 4.47 tonnes per cycle during this period. In the summer months, this figure is significantly higher with an average tonnage per route rising to 13.73 tonnes.
 - It has been observed that a number of householders do not present their garden waste bin on each cycle during the winter period, and quantities of garden waste contained in bins that are presented tend to be less than at other times of the year. However, the same number of vehicles and crews are required to cover the routes
- 4.3 It is therefore proposed to discontinue the collection of garden waste during the winter period from December to February. Householders could store the smaller quantities of garden waste generated over this period within the brown bin and present this for collection during the first collection cycle in March
- 4.4 It is acknowledged that some householders may wish to continue to dispose of garden waste during the winter period. This can be managed through the existing provision of large skips at both Household Waste Recycling Centres at Baldovie and Riverside where householders can take garden waste all year round. Further information on disposal options would be provided through the council website

4.5 As well as the financial benefit of the suspended collections it is anticipated that a reduction in carbon emissions could be achieved each year by refuse collection vehicles not collecting the small tonnages of garden waste generated during the winter months.

Analysis of collection tonnages throughout the year shows that quantities significantly reduce throughout the winter months with tonnage per route falling from 13.7 tonnes to 4.4 tonnes during the winter months. During the discontinuation period, we intend to monitor garden waste deposits at HWRCs as well as monitoring tonnages from the first collections in March 2019.


