1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To seek approval of the service redesign for Community Based Family Learning.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Committee:
 - a) Approve the proposed revised model of working which will see the remit for Family Learning move from a dedicated team to becoming an embedded learning offer across Communities Adult Learning staff
 - b) Agree the revised staffing complement.

3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 This change of remits would propose 4 vacant Grade 8 posts be deleted resulting in a saving of £142,000

4.0 BACKGROUND

- A dedicated Family Learning Team sits within the Adult Learning Section of Housing & Communities, Neighbourhood Services. This team support families/carers in community settings to build their capacity to support their children's learning and development. The increase in provision and policy direction to provide a wider range of support to children and families, through additional early years placement and increased focus on support to families through school, has resulted reduction in demand leading to the need to review how this team operates and works. This work is being reviewed alongside Children and Families services looking at the learning offer for young people, families and communities and ensuring services work in partnership
- 4.2 It is proposed to change the role of the dedicated family learning staff having them take up a wider Community Learning and Development remit, within the Adult learning section. This will increase the capacity of current staff to deliver a wider learning offer without any impact on their job descriptions or grades, whilst offering a more flexible learning centred service.
- 4.3 Family Learning will become embedded in the support provided through Adult Literacy and English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), as both these areas have been experiencing increased demand from parents who are requiring to develop their English and literacy skills. Other family work will be taken forward through our network of Community Centres, looking to increase the range of family opportunities available, particularly focusing on families in most deprived areas of Dundee, where demand for low cost family activities has been highlighted through the Local Community Plans




