1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 This report provides information on the terms of reference of the Scottish Child Abuse Inquiry and progress to date. It outlines the potential implications for the Council and the actions taken thus far.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that Committee:

- 2.1 Notes the potential implications of the Inquiry for the Council;
- 2.2 Endorses the arrangements that are in place through the Child Protection Committee to respond to these implications;
- 2.3 Instructs the Executive Director of Children and Families to report back on any emerging local issues.

3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 It is anticipated that there will be resource implications associated with locating and providing evidence, communications and support to staff. The cost of this will be contained within existing Revenue Budgets. Any increased demand for services for adult survivors, potential compensation claims and associated costs will need to be assessed as the Inquiry progresses.

4.0 MAIN TEXT

4.1 The Inquiry which was set up under the Inquiries Act 2005 to raise public awareness of the abuse of children in care and provide an opportunity for public acknowledgement of the suffering of children. The Inquiry covers the period which is in living memory of any person who suffered abuse to a date no later than 17 December 2014. Under the terms of the Inquiry, a child means a person under the age of 18 and children in care will include children in institutional residential care such as children's homes, secure care units including List D schools, Borstals and Young Offenders' Institutions. It also includes state, private and independent Boarding Schools, health care establishments which provided long term care and foster care. It does not include abuse in non-residential settings. The Inquiry is chaired by Lady Smith and anticipates reporting to Scottish Ministers within 4 years with recommendations to improve the law, policies and practices in Scotland.

- 4.2 The Inquiry is currently taking evidence from people who were abused particularly those where there is a priority need eg those who are receiving end of life care. This will be extended to cover all survivors through 2017. The Inquiry will not force a person who has suffered abuse to give evidence but it does have the power to require witnesses, including Elected Members, to provide evidence. Failure to comply may be considered an offence.
- 4.3 The Inquiry cannot award compensation but the Limitation (Childhood Abuse) (Scotland) Bill has recently been published by the Scottish Government and proposes removing the 3 year time-bar for actions of damages in respect of personal injuries resulting from childhood abuse.
- 4.4 The Inquiry held a preliminary hearing on 31 January 2017. During this a comprehensive update on the work of the Inquiry was provided and it was confirmed that over 50 residential care establishments are currently being investigated. To date, two establishments in Dundee have been identified as being subject to investigation, Balgowan List D School and Roseangle Orphanage (St Vincents). Both establishments closed in the early 1980s. Dundee City Council is currently reviewing what information it holds which may assist in the Inquiry.

Public hearings will proceed in phases with the first commencing on 31 May 2017.

- 4.5 Locally, it has been agreed that the Child Protection Committee is the most appropriate body to co-ordinate responses to the implications of the inquiry. A sub-group chaired by the Chief Social Work Officer has been established which includes representation from Children and Families, Legal Services, City Archivist, Neighbourhood Services, Health and Human Resources. Initial actions have included:
 - Taking steps to prevent the destruction of relevant records/evidence;
 - Maintaining an overview of subject access requests and any emerging historic practice issues;
 - Collating information regarding residential care provision within Dundee over the period of the Inquiry;
 - Considering the potential financial implications of compensation claims from survivors should the Limitation (Childhood Abuse) (Scotland) Bill pass;
 - Liaison with neighbouring authorities around emerging issues and the potential for a shared approach.
- **4.6** Now that the Inquiry has held its preliminary hearing, the next steps will be to look at the broader issues around communication and support to staff.

5.0 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

This report has been screened for any policy implications in relation to Sustainability, Strategic Environmental Assessment, Anti-poverty, Equality Impact Assessment and Risk Management.
