1 PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of this report is to re-examine the payments made to short break carers who provide adults with short breaks through the Home from Home scheme.

2 **RECOMMENDATIONS**

It is recommended that the Social Work Committee:-

2.1 Agrees with effect from 1 December 2002 to increase payments to Home from Home carers as per appendix 2.

3 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 The cost of this increase will be met from current revenue budget provision.

4 LOCAL AGENDA 21 IMPLICATIONS

4.1 The further development of the Home from Home Scheme will contribute to the inclusion of people with disabilities in local communities

5 EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES IMPLICATIONS

5.1 The increased rate of payment will offer a realistic employment and skill enhancement opportunity within local communities for people who become short break carers with the Home from Home Scheme.

6 MAIN TEXT

6.1 The Home from Home scheme was developed 14 years ago to provide a family based short break scheme for older people. The current scheme offers this service to all service user groups, in a flexible way which includes short breaks of a few hours per week, residential breaks in a Home from Home carers home, holiday escorts and short breaks in the service users home (see Appendix 1/Table 1). Short break carers are recruited, vetted, trained and accredited to provide these services. They are paid on a daily or half daily basis.

- 6.2 Increasing the allowance paid to short break carers would encourage increased recruitment. Recruitment has been an ongoing difficulty for Home from Home for many years and there are currently only three approved carers despite ongoing publicity and events. By increasing the rate of payment it is hoped to stimulate interest in the community and improve recruitment and retention of carers. The Home from Home scheme would seek to recruit 12 carers in total, over the coming financial year.
- 6.3 The increased range of services provided and service user groups catered for, (See Appendix 1/Table 2) mean that short break carers have to acquire a wider range of skills and perform a greater range of tasks than previously. In addition recent policy developments such as the National Care Standards have added to their duties. Increasing the rate of payment would better reflect these revised duties.
- 6.4 The rates of payment (as detailed in Appendix 1/Table 3) in other family based schemes are generally higher than that of the Home from Home scheme. The exceptions include Angus Home from Home which has had very limited success and currently only has one carer (who is approved by Dundee Home from Home). Perth & Kinross has no equivalent scheme.
- 6.5 The cost of living has increased over the years and short break carers can expect to incur up to £114.50 a week in expenses. This figure is based on the Inland Revenue's guidance for allowable expenses and includes expenses such as fuel, food and cleaning products. The payment to short break carers has remained constant at £145 per week since 1999. This means that the actual daily payment to carers after expenses are deducted equates to £4.36 per day. Increasing the weekly rate to £250 would give short break carers a daily rate of payment after expenses of £19.35. This would still represent good value for money for a 1 to 1 service provided in a homely environment.

7 CONSULTATION

The Chief Executive, Director of Social Work, Director of Finance, Director of Support Services and Director of Personnel and Management Services have been consulted on the preparation of this report.
