3. LEARNING AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

- Cld practitioners have engaged with a range of learning opportunities, including cld ethics, community empowerment, Adult Achievement Award and multi-agency praxis events, delivered in partnership with the University of Dundee
- Over 400 local, national and international participants attended the *World Community Development* conference which was hosted in Dundee in June 2019, the theme of which was *People, Place and Power*
- The number of cld practitioners working in Dundee, who are registered with the CLD Standards Council, has increased from 73 in 2018 to 93 in 2019, an increase of 27%
- Local cld practitioners contributed to research by Education Scotland and the CLD Standards Council. The recently published *Working with Scotland's Communities* Report details the make-up, challenges and learning and development needs of the cld workforce

1. STRENGTHENING PARTNERSHIP WORKING

Asset Transfer

Following a number of expressions of interests, 4 pre-applications submitted by community bodies are working towards potential asset transfers

Participatory Budgeting - £25k per year—just for young people!!



The Dundee Youth Fund awards grants to projects and activities run by young people or for young people. Applications are assessed by a panel of young people aged between 16 and 26 years

Local Learning Partnerships

Following the review of LLPs, actions for improvement include:

- Improving connections and developing further joint improvement through locality events, including the use of local data (Lochee, Strathmartine, West End, East End)
- Increasing the number of families registered for free school meals (*The Ferry, East End*)
- Improving parental engagement with children's learning in transition from P7 to S1 (North East—Ballumbie Primary to Braeview Secondary)
- Develop locality plan to improve engagement between schools, parents and the wider community (*North East, Maryfield, Coldside*)

2. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The How Good is Our Community Engagement self-evaluation toolkit has been developed to assist the Dundee Partnership to adopt a consistent approach to high quality engagement, linked to the National Standards
