1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

The purpose of this report is to outline plans to implement financial guidelines which will maximise the use of resources within Older Peoples Services and enable more older people to remain at home.

2.0 **RECOMMENDATIONS**

It is recommended that:

- 2.1 a financial guideline for care at home services for older people at a cost of up to 15% above the national care home rate for nursing care homes (resulting in a maximum resource equating to up to £667 per week) is adopted;
- 2.2 where the older person is assessed as requiring a specialist care home provision in a care home which would cost more than the national care home rate, that the maximum resource equates to 15% more than the cost of the specialist provision to reflect the additional needs; and
- 2.3 the maximum resource be reviewed annually in line with the national negotiations around care home rates.

3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

It is anticipated that this proposal will reduce expenditure annually by £50,000 primarily through restricting the potential for further cost pressures to be placed on this budget.

4.0 MAIN TEXT

4.1 The Social Work Department provides care and support to older people who live at home. Many older people are now remaining at home much longer with the result that when older people enter residential care, the level of support they require is higher at the time of admission than would have been previously demonstrated. To meet the needs of this increasingly frail older population requires additional supports and services. This is particularly apparent where the individual has either complex long-term conditions or moderate to severe dementia. As more older people remain at home it is anticipated that requests for larger packages of support will also increase and with the introduction of Self Directed Support, more people will seek to have this support provided through the option of a Direct Payment. As a result, the Social Work Department will be asked to balance the costs of providing very high support packages at home to older people who have been assessed as requiring a more communal support arrangement, against the ability to provide more older people with a care and support package which allows them to remain at home for longer.

- 4.2 Over the last year, the Social Work Department has been asked to provide 24 hour support at home for individual older people who have been assessed as requiring a level of care and support equivalent to that provided by either a residential or nursing care placement. In some circumstances, the request is made by the family who have made a commitment to their relative that they would not be admitted to a care home. Families may supplement the support provided and the higher level costs relate to overnight care at home. Where the financial cost of the care at home package equates to the cost of a care home placement, the overall cost to the Social Work Department will be greater if the care is provided at home. This relates to the differences between the residential and nonresidential charging policies, where the individual's contribution is less than it would be if moving into a care home setting.
- 4.3 At this time, there is no clear financial policy for requests for higher packages of support and each case is negotiated on an individual basis. Any requests for packages of care at home above the nursing care home rate are referred to the Cases Sub-Committee for a decision. This is out of step with other councils where the maximum resource available has been set at the nursing care home rate or at a pre-set limit. To date, where the requested level of support exceeds the nursing care home rate, only a portion of the costs requested have been agreed and this has been negotiated at between 17% and 20% above the costs of a nursing care home placement. This lack of policy can result in an inconsistency in decision making and a lack of clarity as to the basis in which decisions are made. There is also a potential for an unequal distribution of resources which will result in less older people receiving the support they require to maintain them at home.
- 4.4 It is therefore proposed that the level of a care at home support provided by the Council be set at 15% above the cost of a nursing care placement (resulting in a maximum cost of up to £667.00 per week). This maximum level of support should be revised annually in line with the national review of the care home placement rate as negotiated by COSLA. The level of contribution by individuals will be subject to means testing in line with the Councils charging policy.
- 4.5 Where the assessment determines that a specialised care home placement is required and that this would be financially costed at a higher rate than the national nursing care home rate plus 15%, then the maximum resource should reflect this additional need and be linked to the specialist care home rate. Service users currently receiving a package of care and support above the proposed maximum resource, would continue to receive the individually negotiated support provided. The new rate would be applied to new applicants. Where a service user requires an intensive level of support to meet a crisis situation, short term services will be provided as required.
- 4.6 The introduction of a clear policy statement setting out the maximum level of resources available for individuals will ensure equitable decision making across older people's services when allocating resources. It allows older people and their families to make informed decisions when choosing future care options. In addition, the management of the budget in this manner will ensure that more service users have access to services which enable them to remain at home by maximising the use of the available resources to the Council.

*It should be noted that for a small number of older people, this policy will have a negative impact as the full cost of the desired care package will not be funded by the Council. The majority of older people requiring care at home will receive a positive impact.

(We must ensure at this stage that we are not achieving equality for one strand of equality at the expense of another)	The intention in adopting a financial guideline to the cost of care at home services provided by Dundee City Council is to ensure equity in decision making across Older People's Services when allocating resources therefore more service users will have access to services which enable them to remain at home.
2.	Have any negative impacts been identified? For individuals who wish to remain at home with an increased package of care and support, they or their families will be required to financially supplement any additional costs or provide support directly in another manner (e.g. carer support). Generally the costs of care for older people is less than that which could be provided within a care home setting and only those care packages which exceed this level would be subject to the policy change. In addition the contribution made by individuals would be less than if in a care home setting where the personal contribution would be much higher.
		The council has always set a maximum cost for care packages within its Direct Payment guidance (in that the costs of the care must not exceed that which can otherwise be arranged for by the Council). An inequity can be implied as the market costs of care for Older People (within Care Homes) is generally lower than that for Adults who would require a specialist residential placement. It is therefore the comparable costs which are not equitable rather than the policy implementation. The personal contributions between Adults and Older People are also not equitable as Older People are entitled to Free Personal Care and would therefore not be charged for these elements of their care which may be accounted for with Adults.
3.	What action is proposed to overcome any negative impacts? (e.g. involving community groups in the development or delivery of the policy or practice, providing information in community languages etc. See Good Practice on DCC equalities web page)	Through setting the Council's maximum contribution to the cost of care and support packages at home at a value which reflects the higher cost of care home placements (nursing care) with an additional 15% allowance, service users would still be in a position to receive a very intensive care package thereby reducing the impact on their families and any personal financial contribution.

(If the policy that shows actual or potential unlawful discrimination you must stop and seek legal advice)	For some service users, this will cost less to the individual than a care home placement as the Free Personal Care element would still be applied. The package provided would follow an assessment of need, and the manner in which the support was arranged would be negotiated with the individual and their family to make best use of the resource available. The individual and family would be clear as to the resource available when making longer term decisions and this information will be available at an earlier stage in the decision making process.
