### **Corporate Risk Implications:**

There are risks associated with the subject matter of this report which depart from the norm of Council activity but having undertaken an analysis of the upside and downside risks of the activity there is a clear benefit to the Council or its citizens in undertaking the partnership activity in the manner proposed.

### **Corporate Risk Mitigating Actions:**

The level of drug related deaths in the city has led to extensive public interest and concern. The publication of the Dundee ADP action plan carries the possible downside risks of initial negative press coverage, disappointment from members of the public expecting significant



and immediate service changes and objections from national and/or local public figures. However these negative aspects are more than offset by the expected benefits of improved service provision and better outcomes for individuals, families and communities which will be delivered through the implementation of the measures in the action plan. Ongoing engagement with individuals and families with lived experience will inform the implementation and assessment of progress. The Dundee Drug Death Review Group will continue to monitor the level of drug-related deaths and their reports will form part of continuous monitoring at the Dundee ADP.
