Broughty Ferry Code of Practice for Water Users

The Tay estuary is a beautiful place enjoyed by many people and is great for nature. Please follow this code. Be safe, Be responsible, Be considerate.



All water users



Always check the weather and tide times.



Let someone ashore know your plans and expected return time.



Beware of the cold, enter the water slowly and wear a well-fitting wetsuit.



Always carry a means of calling and signalling for help.



Be visible (e.g. wear bright clothing, hi-vis swim cap, stay in groups.



DO NOT approach vessels navigating the shipping channel.



DO NOT endanger other water users or wildlife.

All craft



Always wear a lifejacket and carry the correct safety equipment.

Look out for swimmers and small craft, pass them slowly.

All craft should carry a VHF radio and maintain a listening watch for navigational and traffic updates on channel 12 and 16.

Be responsible



Keep noise and wake to a minimum so as not to impact on people and wildlife nearby.




Access points and slipways should be kept clear at all times.



Prevent litter, bin it responsibly or take it home.

Watch out for wildlife



Let wildlife choose how close it wants to get, don't approach closely or chase, and if you have to pass by, go slowly.

Intentional or reckless disturbance or harassment of marine mammals is an offence punishable by a fine of £10,000 and/or up to 12 months imprisonment.

Reports of such incidents should be made to Police Scotland on 101.

All users of mechanically propelled watercraft within the Tay must comply with the designated launch areas, areas for operation, speed limits and exclusion zone as advertised and displayed.
