Dundee Climate Fund

The new £750,000 Dundee climate fund to help grow community projects has been launched in the city as part of Scotland's Climate Week.

The participatory budgeting exercise will see spending decisions on local initiatives to raise awareness of climate change and reduce carbon emissions made by public vote.

The new fund will run for four years and is designed to raise awareness of climate change while supporting communities to identify and vote on local projects aimed at delivering on the following themes:

- Energy reducing consumption, promoting energy efficiency, use of renewables;
- Transport encouraging active travel, decarbonising transport;
- Waste reducing waste, recycling, reusing resources;
- Resilience improving greenspaces, biodiversity, local food growing; and
- Raising awareness (building capacity) increasing awareness, engaging communities and young people in climate change.

Applications will be considered for both small projects (a minimum of £6000 to a maximum of £25,000) and large projects (up to a maximum of £100,0000) from not-for-profit, constituted groups.

Horizon Europe

<u>Horizon Europe</u> is the EU's flagship funding programme for research and innovation with a seven-year budget of €95.5 billion.

The programme facilitates collaboration and strengthens the impact of research and innovation in developing, supporting and implementing EU policies while tackling global challenges. It supports the creation and deployment of excellent knowledge and technologies. Projects are developed in partnership with other organisations across Europe and beyond.

Horizon Europe is the one EU programme in which UK organisations are stilleligible as the UK Government has contributed to the budget and has guaranteed to fund all UK beneficiaries who have been successful in applying for a Horizon Europe grant with final submission deadlines on or before 31 December 2022.

Calls will be open throughout the duration of the programme (2021-27).

Examples of topics include:

- Designing inclusive, safe, affordable and sustainable urban mobility
- Accelerating the deployment of new and shared mobility services for the next decade
- Nature-based solutions integrated to protect local infrastructure
- Enhanced citizen preparedness in the event of a disaster or crisis-related emergency

Dundee Common Good Fund

The Common Good Fund for 2022/23 has now closed due to all of the funding being allocated. Further funding rounds will become available for activity taking place from May 2023. Local organisations interested in applying to future rounds are advised to read the guidance and prepare their applications in preparation for the next call.

Funding is available for one-off awards to support organisations who deliver services for the common good of the city. Approximately £75k was available this year, with the focus being on projects which support people in need. Awards are generally in the range of £3,000 to £10,000.

Scottish Refugee Council - Reaching New Scots Fund

Organisations are invited to apply for grants of up to £30,000 for projects that help people seeking safety feel more at home in Scotland. Projects must do at least one of the following:

- Raise awareness of services for New Scots
- Remove barriers that prevent New Scots from accessing services
- Build capacity for New Scots to access services

The deadline for applications is midnight on Sunday, 18 December.

Turing Scheme

The Turing Scheme is the UK's programme offering opportunities for young people from schools, those studying in higher education institutions and those in further education, vocational education and training to study and work abroad.

Schools, colleges and higher education providers can apply for funding to allow pupils, students and learners to spend time overseas. Funding can be used to send pupils to learn abroad offering exciting opportunities to all those involved. It is an opportunity to offer pupils a life-changing experience to learn new skills, raise aspirations and get a better understanding of other cultures.

There are two types of placements abroad for the 2023-24 academic year open to schools:

- Short-term placements, which can last from three days to two months
- Long-term placements, which can last from two to six months

Short-term placements are for pupils of any age enrolled in a participating school and are accompanied by school staff. Long-term placements are open to pupils aged at least 14.

Hosting organisations must be non-UK schools that provide general, vocational or technical education at any level from primary school to upper secondary education.

In a previous round several schools from County Durham shared more than £300,000 in grants after Durham County Council's International Relations Team supported their applications.

Round 3 is expected to open in March/April 2023.

Teachers that are interested in applying to Round 3 are advised to contact the External Funding team at the earliest opportunity, in order that they can be supported in developing a bid and finding a host organisation.

Fuel Well Dundee

Applications are being invited for the latest phase of a Dundee scheme which helps households facing fuel poverty with their energy costs.

Fuel Well Dundee has over £1 million available to support people on a low income or who are already experiencing fuel poverty, with energy costs as well as energy advice, income maximisation, debt advice and employability.

Fuel Well 3 has already paid out grants to people who have previously benefited from the scheme. Now the scheme is opening up to households who have not received a Fuel Well grant this year. Funding of £260,000 will support this additional phase.

The Community Ownership Fund

Rounds 3 and 4 of the UK Government's Community Ownership Fund are expected to be launched before March 2023. The aim of the fund is to help ensure that communities can support and continue benefiting from local facilities, community assets and amenities most important to them. A total of £150m is available across the UK with a minimum of £12.3m for Scottish based projects.

Local organisations will be able to apply for grants to help them buy, take over and renovate local community assets at risk of being lost, to run as community-owned businesses.

The Community Ownership Fund has 4 strategic objectives:

- Providing investment for communities to save community assets that would otherwise be lost
- Strengthen capacity and capability in communities to support them to shape their places and develop sustainable community businesses
- Empower communities in left behind places to level up
- Strengthen direct links between places across the UK and the UK Government

Projects may include - sport and leisure facilities, cinemas, theatres, music venues, museums, galleries, parks, pubs, post office buildings and shops.

Grants are up to £250,000. The fund provides 50% match funding. Applicants must contribute the rest. Projects can also apply for up to £50,000 in revenue costs to develop plans, feasibility and business cases to ensure the project is sustainable.

Women's Fund for Scotland

The Women's Fund for Scotland aims to promote systemic change in Scotland to empower women, and to help overcome the multiple disadvantages and discriminatory practices that females experience throughout their lives.

Applications should demonstrate how they fit into one or more of the key investment themes of:

- · Building skills and confidence
- · Improving health and well-being
- Growing social connections
- Moving on from abuse
- Developingleadership and innovation
- Combatting poverty and building financial resilience

Organisations who have a proven track record of working with women and girls can apply for an unrestricted grant of up to £5,000. The deadline to apply is 25 November.

Museums Galleries Scotland Resilience Fund

The Museums Galleries Scotland Resilience Fund is open for applications

Grants of between £1,500 to £50,000 are available for projects which enable accredited museums to reduce costs, increase income and support communities

Travelling with Confidence Grant Programme

The Travelling with Confidence Grant Programme is designed to assist charities and organisations to provide travel training schemes that will have a positive impact the travelling experience of people with disabilities.

Examples of grant funding from this programme could include:

- Grants to improve awareness of responsibilities and influence policy and practice in the transport sector
- Grants to scale, promote awareness of, and increase access to, travel training programmes that increase skills, knowledge, confidence, choice and control when travelling

Charities and organisations can apply for grants between £100,000 and £1 million.

The Robertson Trust

The <u>Robertson Trust</u> is Scotland's largest charitable trust, founded over 60 years ago. Their 2020-2030 Strategy focuses on actions that will help further understand and alleviate the effects of poverty and trauma in our society.

The Trust will fund:

- Organisations seeking to address the immediate needs of their communities in relation to poverty and trauma
- Focus on organisations providing early intervention and improving the design and delivery of systems and services supported by poverty and trauma.
- Capacity building, skills development and enhanced capabilities within the organisation
- Development of multi-agency initiatives and partnerships between organisations

Projects should:

- Address the financial and material effects of poverty on people and communities
- Ensure people have the emotional well-being and strength in their relationships with others
- Equip people for the future through learning and skills pathways

- Sports projects that engage young people from deprived communities; girls and young women, young people with disabilities
